Dear Families.

The term has begun well and it's very pleasing to see many of our students back at school in very settled classes.

We have welcomed some new families, so if you are new to the school, we hope your children are settling in well.

Numeracy improvement is a focus at The Pines. It was pleasing to see an increase in our Year 3 and 5 students achieving high bands achievement in Numeracy NAPLAN last year.

Reading improvement is also an important focus in our school and phonics teaching is assisting our students improve their reading ability. Reading is an essential skill for life and we want our students to develop a love of reading. Reading ability is also an essential component of numeracy.

Parents/caregivers can assist children by reading stories at home. When reading to or listening to children read, discussing and asking questions about what has been read, assists children develop understanding, comprehension.

The importance of regular home reading

You were your child's first teacher and taught them many important skills, including how to speak. Your child will experience the most success in reading when school and home work together. Children learn about the importance of reading as they watch family members use reading and writing for everyday purposes.

Reading for pleasure, sharing a story with your child, using a recipe or reading street signs teaches them that reading is a useful skill in today's world.

Reading with your child at home will help your child in all areas of school. Research shows the importance of reading on a daily basis in developing their use and understanding of vocabulary.

Some strategies that you can use when reading with your child at home.

Pre-reading strategies – look at the title and pictures with your child and discuss what you think the story may be about.

Stop reading at regular intervals and ask your child questions about what has been read so far and what he/she thinks may happen next in the text.

Help from pictures: Encourage your child to take notice of the pictures as they may help him/her to identify an unknown word. Don't cover up pictures as they read.

It is important that children are positively encouraged to have a go with reading.

Vocabulary development by talking to your child and explaining words and their meaning, is an essential part of reading. In our busy lives its important to make some time eg 20-30 minutes to read to or listen to your child read each day. Happy Reading.

Our student reporters thank all the teachers who gave up their time to be interviewed for this newsletter. We appreciate your support.




Learning about the butterfly lifecycle at Preschool

At preschool, we have been learning about the lifecycle of the butterfly. We observed the changes of the Wanderer Caterpillars turning into Monarch Butterflies. The children were very curious and excited, noticing stripy caterpillars, beautiful green chrysalises and even a Monarch butterfly emerging! The butterfly then stayed very still drying its wings before it was able to fly. We then let it go to fly around our garden.

We have learnt new words such as spun, chrysalis, emerging and metamorphosis. We read fiction and nonfiction books about caterpillars and butterflies such as 'The Very Hungry Caterpillar' by Eric Carle and 'From Caterpillar to Butterfly' by Deborah Heiligman. We also watched a time lapse video of the lifecycle of a butterfly. The children demonstrated their learning through discussions, 'reading the pictures' of books and drawings. It was also lovely to see the children sharing this experience with their families.



Q. How do I cancel food orders that have already been paid for?


- A. To cancel a food order from your itemized eReceipt:
- Open Qkr! and tap Activity.
- 2. Scroll down to 'Order History' and sign in with your password.
- 3. Tap the red circle with a minus symbol on the order to be cancelled. Select the entire order or individual items to cancel and tap 'OK'.
- 4. If your eReceipt contains food orders for more than one child, you will need to cancel one by one. $\ensuremath{\mathsf{OR}}$

To cancel a food order from the calendar view:

- 1. Open Qkr! and select the relevant menu.
- 2. Tap on the tick icon on the date for which you want to cancel the order.
- 3. Tap the red circle with a minus symbol on the order to be cancelled. Select the entire order or individual items to cancel and tap 'OK'.

Cancelled items are shown in red on your eReceipt confirming they have been cancelled and a credit is available for future food orders. The value of any credits will be automatically deducted from your next Okri food order.

Please contact your school office to cancel any other (non-food) school payments according to school policy.
