### **Music Performances at The Pines**

We have had lots of music at The Pines School in the last two weeks. Many of our students enjoyed a performance from Music Viva called '**Two Wheel Time Machine**' and then this week, a visit from the **Primary School String Orchestra**. We have also been working with a composer called Adam Page to develop our very own school song. Keep a look out for the next episode of PNN to find out more about this exciting project.

Firstly, we have Selena from Room 29 to tell us about the Musica Viva performance:

On 8<sup>th</sup> August we watched a performance with beautiful songs. Jenny, one of the performers who played the guitar, tried and tried to ride a bike and she had a spectacular failure. She got on the bike, but then fell straight off. She tried to get back on but fell off again and again. Then she got on again and she could finally ride the bike.



There were three performers and their names were Jenny, David and Jess. They all sang and played an instrument.

I loved the performance because it told a story about it being ok to fail because some day you will get it if you keep on trying. My favourite part was when they were singing about the bike because it told a story about riding a bike and trying new things. I also liked it when they made the different sounds on the drums. They made bicycle sounds which made the song sound more interesting.

Vansh from Room 35 shares what he thought about the performance:

I liked the Musica Viva performance because it took you back in time with music and taught us to never give up. I liked the lady with the electric guitar because when she went back in time, she was very funny showing us learning to play the guitar when she was younger. I think the funniest student involvement was when Zara went up to teach Jenny how to ride the bike.



I also liked the way they taught us that sometimes, when you play the wrong note or do the wrong thing, sometimes it turns out being good. When Jenny was young and playing the guitar, she played the wrong thing at a performance, and it ended up sounding better.

There were three musicians, Jenny, David and Jess. Jess plays the bass, Jenny played the electric guitar and David played the drums.

This week we had the **Primary School String Orchestra** visit our school. This orchestra has string students from many different primary schools across Adelaide. Our very own string orchestra students worked hard to learn a piece of music to play with them. It was just amazing seeing students from The Pines School, playing in an orchestra of over 60 students! Some classes watched the performance in the hall, while others tuned in online from their class rooms to watch.

Here is what Caitlin from Room 26 has to say about the experience:

This week, The Pines School string orchestra students played with the Adelaide **Primary Schools String Orchestra (PSSO)**. We have been practising a piece called Paper Peddlers Song for five weeks with our string teachers Sam and Thea. We thank Sam and Thea for helping us achieve a performance goal this term. At the performance the **PSSO** started by playing two pieces, then we joined them. Most of us felt

nervous and excited to play with them and to perform. The PSSO had 42 string players and we had 23. The sound that all the instruments made together was spectacular and it was great being able to play with 65 kids. Later in the performance, the conductor called up a special audience member, which was Belle from room 25, to conduct the orchestra. She was very brave to go up!





I play viola in The Pines string orchestra, and I love being involved in the music program. From this experience I learned how long it takes to master a piece for a performance by practising at home and at school. I chose to play the viola because of the sound it makes and the feeling of joy from playing an instrument that I love.
