Thank you for coming to visit us, we appreciated it so much.







ROOM 25

This term Room 25 has been learning about natural disasters as part of explanation writing in English. We have had a look at a range of natural disasters; their cause, the process of how they occur as well as their devastating effects on people and countries. Students then had an opportunity to research a natural disaster of their choosing and write an explanation. To finish off this engaging topic, the kids made a model volcano in teams and then mixed some common household ingredients to show a chemical reaction and erupt a volcano.









VOLCANOES

A volcano is an opening in the earth's crust where lava, volcanic ash and deadly gases escape from. The word volcano comes from the island Vulcano in Italy where the island Vulcano comes from the Roman god, the god of fire. According national geographic 75% of the world's volcanoes are located around the Pacific Ring of Fire. That is more than 450 volcanoes! The Pacific Ring of Fire is approximately 25,000 miles! That's about 40,233 km. Did you know there are three different types of volcanoes each with different shaping's? They are Stratovolcanoes, Shield volcanoes and Cinder cone volcanoes. Stratovolcanoes are a type of volcanos that are shaped like a cone and have very steep sides. Shield volcanos are like stratovolcanoes but they are very wide. Lastly Cinder cone volcanoes are also shaped like stratovolcanoes except they have a very large bowl-shaped crater.

A volcano can erupt when two tectonic plates collide and the less dense tectonic plate subducts under the other tectonic plate causing the less dense tectonic plate to heat up and cause a volcanic eruption. This is called a convergent plate boundary. Another way a volcano is formed is when two tectonic plates move apart from each other which allows magma to rise up to the surface and cause a volcanic eruption. This is called a divergent plate boundary.

Volcanoes that are caused by the convergent plate boundary tend to send the less dense oceanic plate to subduct (go under) until it reaches within the magma under the earth's crust, which heats the tectonic plate up. This part of the plate melts in the mantle which causes pressure from the magma chamber to rise up and explode through the main vent. If there is too much pressure, secondary vents can be formed where there is another way for the magma/ lava to escape from the magma chamber which is inside the volcano.

Volcanic ash can damage the infrastructure of entire communities. Volcanic ash can enter and ruin the functioning of the machines found in power supply, water supply, sewage treatment, and communication. Volcanoes kill and harm many people because of the deadly gases inside the volcano such as Carbon dioxide (CO2), Sulfur dioxide (SO2) and Hydrogen chloride (HCI). These are just some of the deadly gases that produced when volcanoes erupt. Volcanoes pollute the environment as the Sulfur dioxide gas can lead to acid rain and air pollution downwind from a volcano. After volcanic eruptions most of the food on the land will be ruined, unhealthy for people to consume.

Mt Tambora has been one of the deadliest eruptions in history taking lives up to 120,000 people. This horrific event took place on the 10th of April 1815 sending volcanic ash up to 40km high up into the sky. Being one of the most powerful eruptions in more than 500 years. Mount Tambora ejected so much ash and aerosols into the atmosphere that the sky darkened and the Sun was blocked from view. The whole community was devastated as the sun was blocked for 4 months! Scientists then it called the year without summer as it happened in Summer.

Volcanoes have devastating effects for people and communities and cause major destruction to counties and its infrastructure.
