Tournament of The Minds

On Sunday, The Pines School had two teams compete in the Tournament of the Minds competition.

Tournament of the Minds is an international education program that gives students the opportunity to solve authentic, open-ended challenges. Students work in teams of 7 for six weeks to develop their response to one of 4 set challenges. Students then show their response to the challenge in a ten minute presentation, using a story to show how they have solved the problem. Students read and research, they make decisions, they create, write a script and rehearse as a team.

It has been wonderful seeing the student's confidence develop over the last six weeks, with all their hard work coming together on Presentation Day last week. Both teams did an amazing job with their presentations that they performed in front of judges and an audience of family members and teachers.

Ben, who is also part of the student news team, shares his thoughts about being part of TOM this year:

Hi my name is Ben and I am a part of the Golden Engineers team. On Sunday we went to Adelaide High School for Tournament of the Minds. We carried everything for our presentation

into the building and up one flight of stairs and into a room with five judges.

When we got to our presentation room, we put

everything we needed outside a three-by-three meter square and the judges put a ten minute timer on and told us to begin. We performed a play and showed the judges a short video that we made as part of the challenge. After we had finished our big presentation, went into a separate room with no audience, only three judges and we did a spontaneous challenge.

For this challenge, we had to pick three things that we would like to grow on trees. We had 4 minutes to brainstorm our ideas and 1 minute to present our solution. We chose food so if you are hungry you could take food from nearby trees, our second thing was water so if you are thirsty you can take a drink and the last thing was blankets so if you are cold you can take a blanket from the tree. After that, we left and came back at 4:30pm for the Presentation Ceremony to find out which teams would win awards this year. They went through all of the challenges

and the STEM challenge was last. I heard the honours award being announced first and when

I didn't hear our name I was devastated. But then they said the winners were The Golden Engineers and we were so happy that we won. We were screaming and yelling and some of our team started crying happy tears. Then we all got medals and we got a glass trophy. After the presentation we got told we get to go to Canberra for 4 days and we were super excited!




Room 43

Meet Room 43's little mathematicians! This term, the students have been learning about Measurement, Data and Graphing.

A fun, collaborative activity was undertaken in which students were divided into groups and were asked to survey the teachers about their favourite ice cream flavour. Through this, they managed to collate qualitative and quantitative pieces of information that allowed them to solidify their understanding about the interconnections of data, graphing with accurate measurement techniques. A literacy outcome was also achieved as they were able to enhance their vocabulary through speech and by learning key words associated to the topic.








Along with this, the students have been learning about the various aspects of measurement through an array of physical and visual activities - particularly the understanding and application of formal and informal units.
















