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Dear parent/caregiver,

On November 16, the Commissioner of Police, acting in his role as the State Coordinator responding to the COVID-19 pandemic, announced the Emergency Management (Education and Early Childhood Settings Vaccination) (COVID-19) Direction 2021.

Under this Direction, COVID-19 vaccinations will be mandatory for all people who work or volunteer at The Pines School and Preschool, except those who have a <u>medical exemption</u> endorsed by the Chief Public Health Officer. This includes:

- All of our staff and contractors
- Anyone who visits our schools/preschool/children's centre for work purposes
- Our Governing Council members
- All volunteers and parent helpers (people who assist with reading, camps, excursions, canteen, fundraising etc).

Under this Direction, all of the above-mentioned people must receive at least 1 dose of a Therapeutic Goods Association (TGA) approved COVID-19 vaccination and a booking to receive a second dose by 11.59pm on 10 December 2021, which is the last day of term.

The Direction does not apply to students, parents dropping off or picking up children, attending parent teacher interviews, events or similar, as long as they are not working or volunteering at the event and COVID safe measures are followed.



<u>Remembrance Day</u>

November 11th is Remembrance Day. Since the end of World War 1, on the 11th hour, of the 11th day of the 11th month, Australians take the time to remember the service and sacrifice of our service men and women who suffered or died in the line of duty.

Our school reporters Ella from Room 25, Saanvi from Room 35 and Annabel from Room 33 found out how some of our students at The Pines School remembered this important day.



The students learned 13 different songs with the pianist Debbie before getting ready to perform at the Festival of Music. This year, the Festival of Music celebrated 130 years of primary school music here in South Australia.

2021 was the 130th year of the Primary Schools Festival of Music. I have had the privilege of working with over 30 Year 5, 6 and 7 students, teaching them 12 new songs and practising each Friday in preparation for their final performance. Halfway through the year they were assessed by the choir conductors and received an A-, the highest result I have seen from a choir over the past 8 years! It has been amazing to watch the students' singing abilities improve throughout the year, being able to harmonise in 2 parts- alto and soprano. They showed such bravery and determination to stick to their goals and then get up and perform with 1400 other students at the Adelaide Entertainment Centre. Standing on stage with them was such a memorable experience. The students should all be very proud of their achievement.

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Room 37 Art Installation


Charlie

Room 37 has made this installation art piece during visual art classes. Our installation art piece is based on Japanese artist *Chiharu Shiota*. Our shoe installation draws on personal experiences, emotions and memories to create a sense of what it means to us to be human and walk in each other's shoes.

Amber

We had to bring a shoe that we don't really use anymore. We had to tell a story about it. We could write about what the shoes had been through or you could make something up. I thought it was a fun activity because there are so many stories you got to read from other students.





Abbey

We had to write a story and not include the word shoe because then it would give it away that it was the shoe's story. My story was about going into the Olympics because I like running and I used sports shoes. I really enjoyed it and it was fun not just to think about your own life, but you had to be creative.

Koby

I got a shoe and attached the string which was attached to a hook in the

ceiling. The string connects to the other shoes and the strings show that all the stories are connected.

I wrote about my shoe and going for a long walk. In the story, when the shoe got home, a big creature (big, dark and barking) picked it up and threw it into a small house (kennel). I liked how we got to connect the shoes with the string. The string is bright and draws people to it to have a look and read the stories.





Nathan

I did my shoe story about my shoe getting stuck on the roof. The shoe got stuck and I had to get it down. It stayed up on the roof for a month and it got soaking wet. It was a really fun project, expressing what the shoe had been though and its experiences instead of writing about yourself. What it's like to have the perspective of the shoe. The string is hooked up and connected to all the shoes. It's reaching out to the shoes and telling their stories.
